Why use storybooks?

Advantages of using stories with children:

- 1. Stories are motivating and fun and help develop a positive attitude towards the foreign language and language learning.
- 2. Stories exercise the imagination.
- 3. Children enjoy listening to stories over and over again.
- 4. New vocabulary and structures can be introduced in memorable and familiar contexts.
- 5. Listening to stories develops the child's listening and concentration skills.
- 6. Listening to stories in class is a shared social experience.
- 7. Trough stories, children learn to predict, anticipate, reason, judge and become aware of the story shape.
- 8. Stories help transmit authentic rhythm and intonation: they train the ear and help the children recognize and imitate the music of the language.
- 9. Stories can link to other subjects the child is learning about in school.
- 10. Stories can introduce the child to other cultures.

Using storybooks-methodology

- 1. Identify your linguistic objectives.
- 2. Provide the context for the story and introduce the main characters.
- 3. Explain the context, key words and ideas in the child's mother tongue if necessary.
- 4. Provide visual support.
- 5. Decide how long you will use the story.
- 6. Decide in which order you are going to introduce or revise the language necessary for understanding the story.
- 7. If necessary, modify the story to make it more accessible to the pupils.
- 8. Find out if there are any rhymes or songs that pupils can learn to help reinforce language introduced.
- 9. Decide which follow-up activities would provide opportunities for pupils to produce language from the story in different contexts.
